

BARBARA ALEXANDER TOMPKINS COMMUNITY ACTION

CORTLAND COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM (CAPCO)

In 1990 I was a single mom to two young girls. I wanted them to attend a preschool. I had only been living in the area for a couple of years so I was unfamiliar with what this area had to offer. We lived in a small village in the northern part of the county so I didn't get into the city very often.



One day I made a phone call to Head Start and they called me back. Soon after that my daughters were signed up for preschool. During this time, I volunteered for the program. In September 1991, I began to substitute for the kitchen position. I subsequently applied for a permanent position. I was hired. The Head Start program was under the Community Action Program umbrella. I was given the opportunity to continue my education and get a degree. I advanced through the agency and held a few different positions within the education portion to the family advocate position where I am currently. When my child was accepted into Head Start, an initial home visit with the teachers immediately made me feel comfortable and allowed me to talk with them without anyone else around. My children's teachers were the best! They were thoughtful, nonjudgmental, welcoming, trustworthy and my children absolutely blossomed in their care. I, then, was called to work for Early Head Start, after working in a daycare center for a few years. This program changed my life just as much as it did my children's. It immediately felt like I was home. Supervisors actually showed up, mentored, understood and appreciated my work.
