# **Monthly Myth Series:**

Myth: Impoverished Americans can rise from rags to riches with nothing but hard work. - FALSE!

The United States is theoretically a land of opportunity where anyone can climb the economic ladder with hard work and determination. However, recent research indicates that there is actually less economic mobility in the United States than in the European Union or other wealthy countries. Approximately 50 percent of a father's income advantage is inherited by his son, which means that generational wealth significantly impacts whether and to what extent people thrive.



In the United States, 1 in 25 children raised in the bottom quintile of the income distribution can climb to the top quintile, while the figure in Denmark is nearly 1 out of 6. In our popular rhetoric, we celebrate the success of that single individual to the exclusion of the other 24.

CAPLAW - New CDC Guidance: Implications for CAAs

This CAPLAW News Flash addresses a few key questions that CAAs may have regarding the new CDC COVID-19 safety guidance.



"On May 13, 2021, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released updated safety guidelines for people fully vaccinated against COVID-19. In a major departure from its past guidance, the CDC states that fully vaccinated people do not need to wear a mask or physically distance in any indoor or outdoor setting unless required by federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial laws, rules, or regulations. The new guidance also clarifies that fully vaccinated people do not need to test, quarantine, or be restricted from work following known exposure to COVID-19, if they are asymptomatic unless they are residents or employees of a correctional or detention facility or a homeless shelter. However, they should still monitor for COVID-19 symptoms for 14 days following an exposure..."

# Tips, Tools, & Resources:

### Community Corps - We Can Do This

The Biden Administration has launched a new initiative to boost COVID -19 vaccinations. With the tagline **"We Can Do This," the Community Corps is a coalition of community, religious organizations along with celebrity partners who are coming together to promote vaccination.** Community Action Agencies and State Associations are encouraged to sign up and become a Community Corps organization. Once the organization is a member, you will receive timely and accurate information to share and access resources to build confidence in your communities and more.

#### Federal Communications Commission - *Emergency Broadband Benefits (EBB) Program Goes Live!*

On May 12th, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) opened enrollment for the Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB), a temporary program that helps households afford internet services and equipment during the pandemic. The program offers eligible households a monthly discount of up to \$50 (up to \$75 on Tribal lands) for broadband service and associated equipment rentals. The EBB also offers a one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, tablet, or desktop computer. Eligible households can enroll through an approved provider or by visiting <u>GetEmergencyBroadband.org.</u> The FCC has also published an <u>EBB outreach toolkit</u> with infographics, multilingual flyers, and FAQs.



## FPWA - The Self-Sufficiency Standard for New York 2021

FPWA is an anti-poverty policy and advocacy organization committed to advancing economic opportunity and upward mobility for low-income New Yorkers. Having a prominent New York presence for nearly 100 years, FPWA has long served New York City's human services sector. They provide grants to help individuals and families meet their basic needs and advocate for fair public policies on behalf of people in need and the agencies that serve them.



FPWA is published <u>The Self-Sufficiency Standard for New York 2021</u> to ensure that the best data and analyses are available to enable New York's families and individuals to make progress toward real economic security. The result is a comprehensive, credible, and user-friendly tool. The Self-Sufficiency Standard is a measure that calculates how much income a family must earn to meet basic needs, with the amount varying by family composition and where they live.

#### Kaiser Family Foundation - Latinos and the Nation's COVID-19 Vaccine Rollout

The <u>Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF)</u> and <u>UnidosUS</u> presented an <u>interactive web event</u> on Thursday, May 20th on the latest insights on what is working and what barriers must be overcome in ensuring equitable access to the COVID-19 vaccines for Latinos in the US, including new KFF survey findings from the community.



KFF's analysis of state-reported data shows Hispanic and Black people have received smaller shares of vaccinations compared to their share of cases and their share of the population in most states. New KFF COVID-19 Vaccine Monitor data finds that access barriers and information gaps may be contributing to lower rates. Closing these gaps will be vital to mitigating long-standing health and economic disparities and the disproportionate toll the pandemic has taken on these communities.

# National Human Services Assembly - Beyond Bars: Keeping Young People Safe At Home and Out of Youth Prisons

"Beyond Bars: Keeping Young People Safe at Home and Out of Youth Prisons" is a publication of the National Collaboration for Youth, produced with significant input and work from National Assembly and NCY member, Youth Advocate Programs, Inc. The report should serve as a handbook for juvenile justice administrators, legislators, judges, the non-profit community, and youth advocates for how to end the practice of youth incarceration, promote public safety, and restore a sense of belonging for our young people in their homes and neighborhoods.

The collective experience tells us that communities often characterized by intense needs also have extraordinary assets that

can be easily overlooked. We need to advocate for leveraging those assets as one means to meet those intense needs and providing greater resources for neighborhood-based services and programs.

# National Resource Center for Refugees, Immigrants, and Migrants (NRC-RIM) - Vaccine Central

Immunization rates in the United States are often lower among people born in another country. To avoid compounding the pandemic's burden on refugee, immigrant, and migrant (RIM) communities, local governments must make vaccination more accessible. This will require overcoming barriers to vaccination due to:

- Cultural factors
- Knowledge and beliefs about a disease or vaccine
- Healthcare access



Health departments, community-based organizations, and others have <u>free access to this</u> <u>initial set of resources</u> that support vaccine planning, roll-out, knowledge, and confidence among RIM communities. Please <u>check back</u> regularly as we will continue to update resources as they become available.

National Resource Center for Refugees, Immigrants, and Migrants (NRC-RIM) - Scaling Up COVID-19 Prevention and Mitigation Strategies with Refugee, Immigrant, and Migrant Communities

You can <u>apply now</u> to get up to \$250,000 for your innovative COVID-19 education, testing, contact tracing, vaccination, and other prevention and mitigation strategies in <u>refugee</u>, <u>immigrant</u>, and <u>migrant</u> (RIM) communities.

Local health departments (LHDs) and community-based organizations (CBOs) can be most effective when they work together in partnership. That's why NRC-RIM is partnering with the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) to provide funding and technical assistance to LHDs and their RIM community partners. Even



if a local health department does not yet have an established relationship with a community partner, it is never too late to commit to working together on the COVID-19 response.

The goals of this funding are:

- Improve COVID-19 prevention and mitigation
- Reduce inequities in COVID-19 morbidity and mortality
- Identify best practices and sustainable models for preventing COVID-19 and other communicable diseases.

## NY Project Hope - Coping with COVID

COVID-19 has changed a lot about how we live our lives, from daily routines at home to how we do our jobs. The trained crisis counselors at <u>NY Project Hope</u> understand the changes COVID-19 has made in your life and they know the emotions these challenges create may be strong and sometimes unfamiliar. From uncertainty to



sadness, NY Project Hope helps you cope with your reactions to the changes; providing support so you can work to manage the stress and fatigue.

New Yorkers can call the Emotional Support Helpline to speak with someone who has been trained to give you the kind of support that works best for you during the pandemic; whether it's coping strategies, resources, or a chance to talk - the call is always free, confidential, and anonymous. **NY Project Hope's Emotional Support Helpline number is 1-844-863-9314**. Trained crisis counselors are available every day from 8 AM to 10 PM.

#### New York State of Health - The Deadline for Coverage in 2021 Extended!

To allow as many consumers as possible to access newly enhanced tax credits, and in light of the ongoing public health emergency, **NY State of Health has extended its Open Enrollment Period** 



**for Qualified Health Plans to December 31, 2021**. Individuals eligible for other NY State of Health programs - Medicaid, Essential Plan and Child Health Plus - can enroll year-round. The best way for consumers to receive assistance at this time is to <u>phone a navigator or other NY</u> <u>State of Health assistor</u> for help.
